#### 03 STUDIO ANYBODY

With a roll of Astroturf to defend and a white picket fence of dubious construction to protect us from alien intruders, this model questions the Howard Government's dream for the Australian 'home' and it's dream for 'Australia'. These items are portable and affordable for all, they provide peace of mind – if not shelter, permanence or a humanitarian conscience.

#### 04 MINIFIE NIXON

Our response is not a reification of the suburban dream. Rather, a relationship has been created between the abstract and the iconographic, where only a shadow of a dream remains.

#### 05 KORBAN FLAUBERT

People these days go to work to buy things to keep safe in their houses

'HANDS OFF MY STUFF!!!'

Is it just our imagination? Parallel with the media explosion in homewares/renovation shows comes a new awareness and paranoia about security, defence, borders...

What's going on? We're houseproud but scared? So this version of the new house is: a defensive container for things less accessible for friends and neighbours perhaps but a lot safer! Try getting in here and stealing our stuff! Just make my day.

#### 06 RBB TERROIR

The expansion of the 'McBurbs' mentality has widened the gap between our discourse and that of the masses – for whom the Great Australian Dream is so important – to the point where dialogue is no longer possible. The Great Australian Dream of the 'McBurb' dwellers is our nightmare. We can only respond by holding our line, using the 'popcraft' kit to develop the design of a residential project. We hope then to further the debate not via attempts at reaching a middle-ground, but through the proposition of alternatives. We have faith that our profession still has the ability to continue in its historic role, shifting debate via a dogged continuation of 'art'.

#### 07 MUNK: MIRIAM BORCHERDT WITH DIEGO RAMIREZ

Our 'object' is not a literal model of a house, but rather the illustration of an idea.

One of the main issues we have addressed is the quality and effect of light in Australia. The woven surfaces represent materials that allow for filtering light, as well as graduated visual transparency. It investigates an alternative to solid materials, where density and sparsity are achieved through the varied use of the same material. The 'plan' attempts to move away from the blunt separation of indoor and outdoor space that the conventional model represents. Different levels of enclosure are achieved through gradual transitions.

#### 08 CHRIS CONNELL

Densely populated cities demand a reduction in lot sizes. This tall, slender home offers compact living and working areas that revolve around centrally located areas of habitat and function. Wails pivot and slide to give the home flexibility with regard to entries and light depending on context. Economies of space and a desire for light have forced the private open space and outdoor entertaining onto the roof top.

#### 09 CODA

Use less, not more, do more with less and recycle unused pieces. Explore possible permutations with limited means by composing individual homes and explore the possibility of shared land ownership.

#### 14 CASSANDRA COMPLEX

Our dreams force the city to breathe; out through the suburbs [expansion] and in through the city [contraction], this is the torus. Never-ending breathing, massaged by the desires of each generation who will still all look up and see the same stars.

#### 15 NICHOLAS MURCUTT

We may consider not living in a single house but a series of rooms deployed over a 'territory' and considerate of existing natural conditions. They are presented as laminations, implying solar orientation and stormwater runoff. Darker, cooler, intimate rooms are within a 'thickened' wall, whilst lighter 'sticks and sheets' are used to construct decks, wet areas, sleep outs and barbecues (adjustable to seasonal demands). Vegetation is captured and enhanced to create green corridors from site to site. Large families can extend across sites, renting annex spaces from neighbours. MOST IMPORTANTLY IT IS PLAYFUL.
